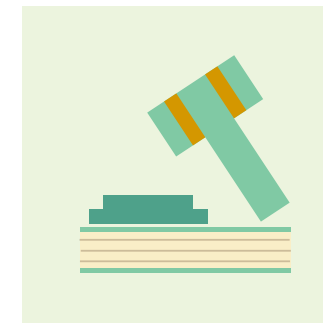

Law

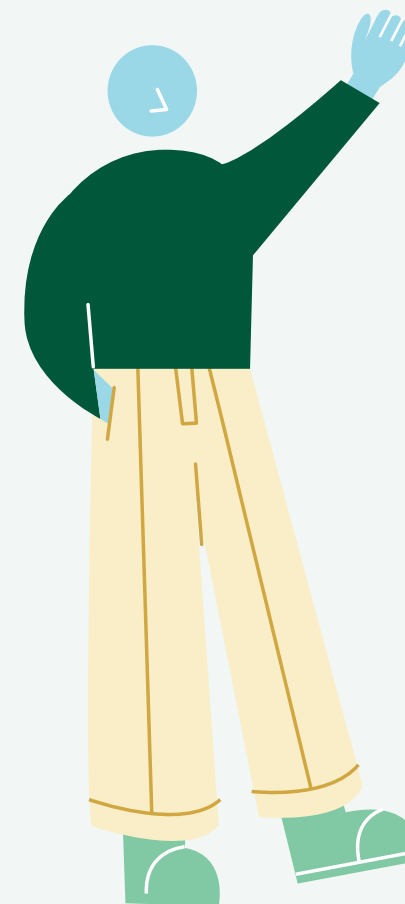
Experiential Learning: Complete an internship in which you work on research, policy, advocacy, and public speaking.

Academics Plus: Take courses with hands-on and practical elements — Introduction to Business (Business), Labour Relations and Collective Bargaining (Business), Economics and Government (Economics), Community-Based Internship (International Relations), Public Policy and the Media (Communications and Public Policy), etc.

Extra: Complete STU's Certificate in Experiential Learning to show how you used practical elements to enhance your university experience.



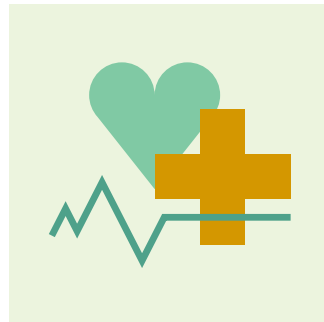

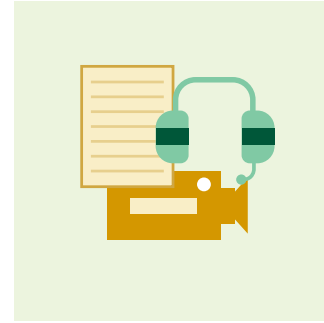
Health

Academics: Take courses from Gerontology, Human Rights, Psychology, Sociology, Women's Studies and Gender Studies, and more.

Academics Plus: STU has research centres focused on health which host events throughout the year to supplement class learning. Health-related research by STU faculty is also an area of opportunity — become a research assistant to get hands-on experience of your own.

Experiential Learning: Internships with health care organizations, long-term care facilities, and local shelters are a great way to add professional health care experience to your resume. On-campus volunteer and work opportunities are also a fantastic way to start working with people.

Extra: Graduates who pursued careers in health previously interned or worked with organizations including AIDS New Brunswick, Hospice Fredericton, New Brunswick Lung Association, and York Care Centre.



Journalism and Digital Media

Academics: Our Department of Journalism and Communications and Public Policy has a track record of producing work-ready graduates who excel in media-related fields because they focus on good writing, reliable research, and mastering the tools needed to tell important stories. Our interdisciplinary major in Digital Media and Creative Arts will provide you with diverse knowledge and skills to excel in a career in this field.

Academics Plus: Take courses that require you to get out into the community to cover news and events. Also seek out courses with technical aspects to ensure you are learning how to use the hands-on tools for a media-focused career.

Experiential Learning: Many of our partner organizations will hire STU students as communications, marketing, digital, and social media interns. Earn a Certificate in Digital and Media Literacy with your degree for evidence of hands-on learning.

Extra: Improve your interviewing and writing skills by working for *The Aquinian*, the student-run news outlet on campus.



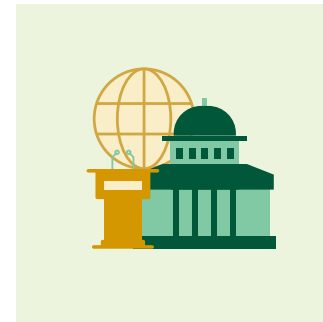

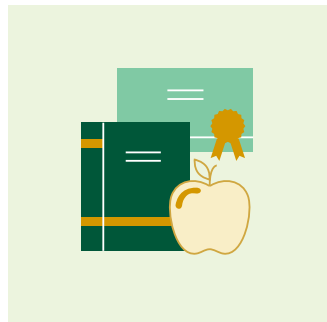
Community and Governmental Affairs

Academics Plus: Every department at STU sheds light on an aspect of society that requires thought, care, and action. Study what you're passionate about to carve out an area of interest for yourself.

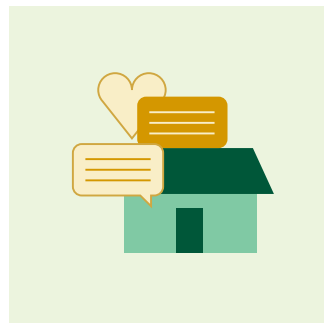
Experiential Learning: Consider interning with a governmental organization or NGO to see how they serve local communities.

Social Work

Academics: The best way to prepare for a career in social work is to learn as much about society as you can. Relevant areas of study are Sociology, Criminology, Gerontology, Psychology, Human Rights, and Native Studies.

Academics Plus: As a Bachelor of Arts student, you are able to take courses from the School of Social Work before applying to the program at the end of second year.

Experiential Learning: Our Office of Experiential Learning partners with local organizations that put you into the community in a hands-on way. Work with The Ville Cooperative or the United Way, or intern with organizations like the Canadian Mental Health Association, Capital Region Mental Health, and Addictions Associations.

Extra: Starting at STU means you'll have access to the School of Social Work, which offers a Bachelor of Social Work, the Mi'kmaq Maliseet Bachelor of Social Work, and a Master of Social Work.

Education

Academics: Focus on “teachable” subjects, such as English, French, History, Native Studies, Fine Arts, Psychology, and more.

Academics Plus: The liberal arts help diversify your academic experience — it's important to have knowledge from multiple fields of study when pursuing a career in education. Seek out courses that focus on youth for added value.

Experiential Learning: STU partners with organizations like Autism Connections Fredericton, Big Brothers Big Sisters, the Child and Youth Advocate Office, Enrich Kids, and others.

Extra: Starting at STU means you will have access to the university's School of Education to speak with students and faculty and attend info sessions on campus. The School of Education offers a post-degree Bachelor of Education.

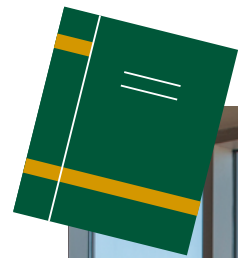

Bachelor of Arts

STU offers a uniquely personal experience that creates a learning environment where students thrive.

- Flexibility to tailor your degree to reflect your career ambitions
- Opportunity to work closely with your professors
- Sense of community that permeates classrooms and common areas

Major: Declare your major at the end of your second year. Your major is the area you will focus on and the subject in which you will take the greatest number of courses. You are able to major in more than one subject.

Minor: A minor consists of several courses in a specific area, but not as many as a major.

Honours: If you're interested in a particular field of study and/or are considering graduate school, consider honouring. Honours programs demand a greater number of courses in a subject — including advanced-level courses — and a thesis is often required.

Aquinas: Great Books — An Innovative Approach to First Year

Aquinas: Great Books is an optional one-year program for first-year students. It is made up of three full-year courses (English, Political Science, Philosophy) and team-taught by professors from each discipline. You will round out your schedule with an additional two courses of your choosing per semester.

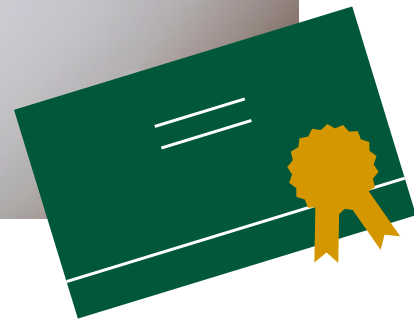
Interdisciplinary Studies

Anthropology

Honours / Major / Minor

Anthropology is the study of human diversity, past and present, in all of its material, physical, social, and cultural forms. Get practical experience interacting with others in various social contexts, have the opportunity to excavate artifacts, and learn to analyze bones in our lab.

Major / Minor

Catholic Studies debates issues that engage Catholics and those interested in a serious study of Catholicism. It contributes to a more informed understanding of Catholicism's contributions to intellectual, institutional, political, and cultural life.

Communications and Public Policy

Major / Minor

Explore the connection between communications and the creation and implementation of public policy. Organizations need communications professionals to interact with the public, communicate effectively internally, and disseminate information through online channels, social media, and public or media relations. In upper years, complete a communications internship. STU offers the only major in communications and public policy in Canada.

Criminology and Criminal Justice

Honours / Major / Minor

Study crime, criminal behaviour, and the way society responds to those who have been identified as criminal or deviant. Study theories of criminal behaviour and analyze the criminal justice system. Courses reflect faculty specializations in youth rights and justice, criminal law and social justice, effective correctional punishment, crime and the media, and the history of crime and the law.

Digital Media and Creative Arts (Interdisciplinary)

Major

For students interested in studying digital media and engaging in the creation of digital arts, this program allows you to explore the relationship between digital media, the arts, and society. It draws on courses from multiple departments and incorporates a broad range of digital practices. The STUdio has a smart classroom, digital editing suites, and sound booths for podcast production.

Fine Arts (Interdisciplinary)

Major / Minor

Courses are offered in music, musical theatre, visual arts, and film. Develop your artistic literacy while cultivating a critical awareness of the aesthetic dimensions of everyday life and culture. Examine fine arts through technical, social, performance, and historical perspectives. The program aims to broaden the understanding of art from a hands-on perspective. Faculty — all professional, active artists — will meet you at your own stage of artistic growth.

Economics

Honours / Major / Minor

Study how the economy works, where it came from, the challenges it creates for social equality and social justice, and how individuals engage to modify and change economic relations. Develop knowledge of various approaches to market economics, political economy, the international economy, and Canadian institutions and policy. A major in economics also offers the opportunity to focus in business.

Gerontology

Major / Minor

Gerontology at STU is one of only three comprehensive Canadian undergraduate programs in the field. Gerontology is the study of development and aging. Examine aging from sociological, psychological, physical, spiritual, and philosophical perspectives, while exploring how society defines aging and how individuals understand their own later years.

English Language and Literature

Honours / Major / Minor

Studying English goes beyond reading texts. Learn to read the world in which we live and understand the linguistic mechanisms that shape us. Master critical reading, write about ideas and texts, and learn collaboratively through discussion and debate. Courses will give you the opportunity to diversify your studies. The department also offers a major in English with a concentration in Creative Writing.

Great Books

Honours / Major / Minor

Great Books is an interdisciplinary program focused on the study of classic works of literature, philosophy, and politics. Courses focus on the great books of the Western tradition, examining the diverse opinions of influential thinkers on love, freedom, friendship, justice, beauty, and reason. Environment and Society

Honours / Major / Minor

Learn to understand the social processes that promote the degradation of the earth and our persistence in such destructive behaviour. As the issue of environmental deterioration originates with human behaviour, causes and solutions for them can be found in the social sciences and humanities. School of Social Work

Bachelor of Social Work

The four-year Bachelor of Social Work — the only accredited English language program in New Brunswick—emphasizes the understanding of the structural roots of social problems in society.

- Develop the ability to challenge structural injustices
- Learn critical theories to frame best practices
- Understand how different forms of power, oppression, and privilege operate in the world

Students complete two practicums, one in third year and one in fourth year. This offers the opportunity to gain professional experience, put theory into practice, and build a professional network. Students interested in the Bachelor of Social Work will complete two years of the Bachelor of Arts program before applying.

Bachelor of Education

After you complete your Bachelor of Arts at STU, you will be prepared to pursue post-degree and professional programs, like STU's Bachelor of Education.

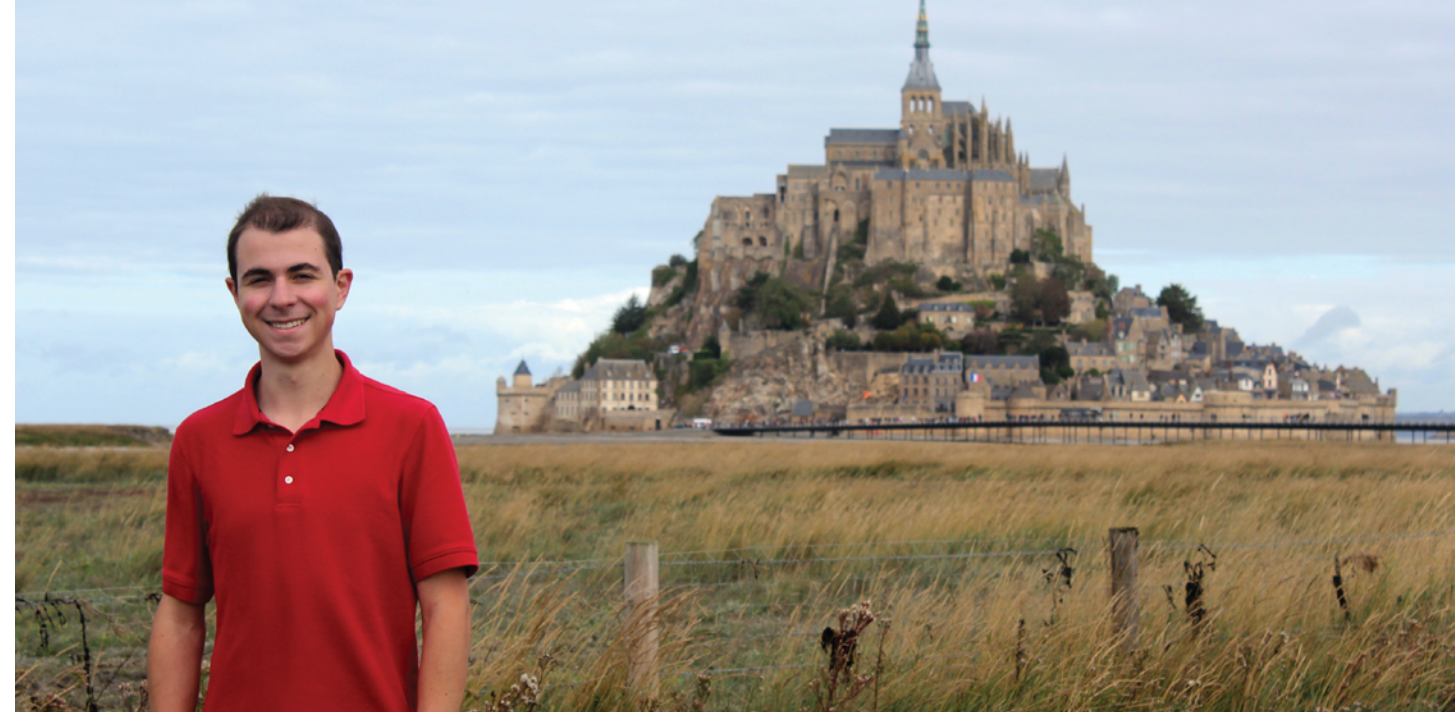

Past opportunities have taken students to **Italy, Cuba, Germany, England, New York City, Ireland, China, Spain, and Greece.**

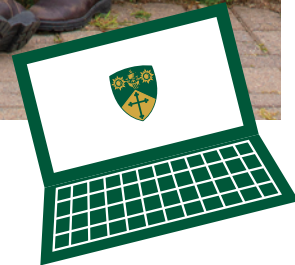

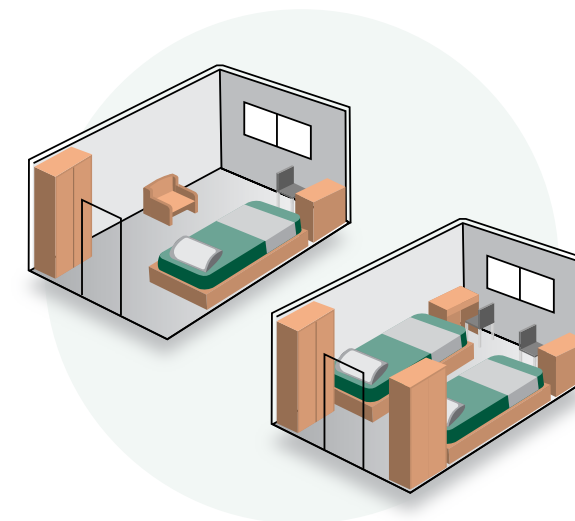

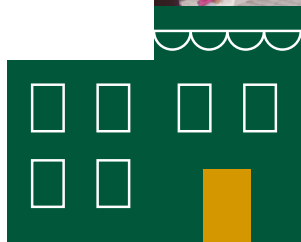

How to Apply

We are so pleased that you are interested in applying to STU!

Applying is quick and easy, and our team is here to help you throughout the admissions process. We look forward to hearing from you!

1. Complete Your Application

- Submit the online application at [STU.ca/applynow](https://www.stu.ca/applynow) beginning on October 1.
- Pay the application fee: \$40 NB residents; \$55 non-NB residents.



2. Submit Your Transcript

- Canadian High School Applicants: Upload your transcript on your applicant portal or email your transcript to admissions@stu.ca.
- Transfer Applicants and International High School Applicants: Please request to have your official transcript sent to admissions@stu.ca by your secondary school or post-secondary institution. International applicants may be required to submit an official English language proficiency test.
- When your documents arrive and are verified, your online document checklist will be updated.

3. We Will Keep You Updated

- You will receive an email (1) confirming your application has been submitted, (2) when your application is under review, and (3) when an admission decision has been made. Keep an eye on your online checklist for updates on the status of your application.

4. Apply for Scholarships and Bursaries

- To be considered for scholarships and bursaries, you must submit an application within your applicant portal after you receive an offer of admission.
- The deadline to apply for scholarships and bursaries is March 1, 2024, but you are encouraged to apply as soon as you receive your offer of admission as scholarships are awarded on a rolling basis as funds allow. The sooner you apply, the sooner you may receive an offer.
- By submitting one complete application, candidates will be considered for the majority of awards that are available to entering students.

5. Accept Your Offer of Admission

- Confirm your place at STU by paying your admission confirmation deposit on your applicant portal. This deposit will be credited towards your tuition.

Admissions Information

High School Students

To be considered for admission, applicants must have a minimum average of 70% on five successfully completed Grade 12 academic courses including Grade 12 academic English (or French for applicants from Francophone schools).

Early Admission (October — January): We require your final Grade 11 transcript and a Grade 12 course list.

Regular Admission (February — September): We require your mid-year Grade 12 transcript or final high school transcript if available.

Transfer Students

- You are considered a transfer student if you have graduated from high school and have earned credit from another post-secondary institution from which STU recognizes transfer credit.
- Normally, a minimum 2.0 GPA is required.
- Transfer students will receive an evaluation of eligible transfer credit at the time of admission.

Mature Students

- Candidates 21 years of age or older who do not meet the high school requirements are eligible to apply as adult learners.
- Candidates must submit a letter of application describing educational background, work experience, and academic plans.

International Students Studying in Canada

- The English language proficiency score requirement may be waived for students who graduate from a high school in Canada with a final grade of 70% or higher on Grade 12 academic English.

English as a Second Language Program

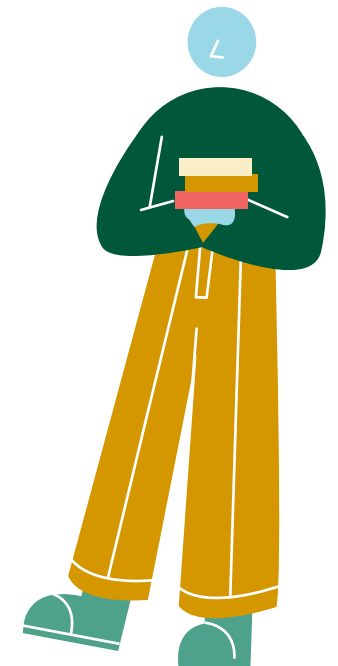

Applicants should **apply for scholarships and bursaries by March 1, 2024.** You may apply after the deadline, as scholarships and bursaries will be awarded after the March 1 deadline as funds allow.

Eligibility

Students with an admission average of 80% or higher are eligible for scholarships, whereas bursaries are awarded based on financial need.
