

## Part-Time Positions in English

St. Thomas University invites applications for instructors to teach the following courses in Fredericton:

Semester 1 (September – December 2023)

**ENGL-3103 Advanced Poetry Workshop** (T/Th 1:00 PM - 2:20 PM). This is an advanced course for students who discovered an affinity for poetry in the introductory course(s). This course provides the opportunity for students to generate and rewrite poems. (Maximum enrolment: 25)

Semester 2 (January – April 2024)

**ENGL-3123 Advanced Script Workshop** (T/Th 1:00 PM - 2:20 PM) This is an advanced course for students who discovered an affinity for writing scripts for stage, screen, or both. It will provide the opportunity for students to generate and rewrite scripts. (Maximum enrolment: 60).
