

Part-Time Position in Environment & Society

St. Thomas University invites applications for an Instructor to teach the following course in Fredericton:

Semester 2: (January to April 2024)

ENVS 3053A Sustainability Auditing, TUESDAYS 6:30 PM – 9:20 PM

The course examines the theories and methods of environmental auditing as they apply to institutional settings. Topics include the role of audits in changing institutional and individual behaviour, the contributions of social sciences to institutional audits, and audit design and implementation. Student projects will involve engaging with aspects of an audit with a community partner.

St. Thomas University is an undergraduate, liberal arts institution with a full-time enrolment of 1,600. Its students graduate with Bachelor of Arts, Applied Arts, Education, and Social Work degrees. The faculty members are distinguished teachers, researchers and scholars, and the university holds two Canada Research Chairs.

A PhD, or imminent completion is preferred; a Master's degree is required. Each applicant is to submit a curriculum vitae, along with pertinent documentation (ex. teaching portfolio etc.) and arrange to have three letters of reference sent directly to Dr. Janice Harvey, Environment and Society Coordinator, St. Thomas University, Fredericton, NB E3B 5G3.
