St. Thomas University invites applications for instructors to teach the following courses in person at Elsipogtog First Nation:

Semester 1 (September – December 2024)

JOUR 1023-Y The Message: Great Stories of Journalism. (M,W 9:00 am – 10:20 am) This course will introduce students to a range of works of print and broadcast Journalism to allow them to understand the scope, purpose, and influence of stories in the journalistic tradition. Students will respond to these works in writing and post their responses in an online discussion forum. (Maximum enrolment: 60)

SPAN 1006-Y Beginning Spanish (M, W, F 2:00pm – 3:50 pm) The beginner's course is designed for students with no previous knowledge of the language. It represents the basic level in the learning of Spanish. Teaching methods and texts will vary from year to year and from instructor to instructor. The aims of the course are the acquisition of (1) listening comprehension, (2) basic vocabulary suitable for everyday conversations, (3) simple grammatical structures, and (4) a knowledge of reading and writing techniques. The basic skills (listening, speaking, reading, writing) are emphasized. In addition, each instructor will introduce the students to selected elements of Hispanic Culture. In addition, students are required to attend a one-hour compulsory monitor session per week. (Maximum enrolment: 60)

Semester 2 (January – April 2025)

SPAN 2013-Y Intermediate Spanish I (M,W 2:00pm – 3:20 pm) This course begins with a review of the first-year course and proceeds to include, in a progressive way, the new components of intermediate grammar. Conversation will be an essential part of the course. Vocabulary expansion will be developed through short readings. The practice of listening, speaking, writing, and reading will give students the opportunity to improve their use of the language. Audio-visual materials will reinforce the student's understanding

of Hispanic Culture. (Maximum enrolment: 60)

Semesters 1 and 2 (September 2024 – April 2025)

NATI 1006-Y Introduction to Native Studies (Team-taught – T, TH 2:00 pm – 3:20 pm). A survey course that introduces students to the discipline of Native Studies. Its purpose is to increase the student's understanding and sensitivity towards the past and present experience of Native peoples. The course will examine precontact history; the influences of colonialism and "primitive accumulation"/capitalism in the postcontact era; and contemporary issues - while emphasizing a historical and materialist perspective. (Maximum Enrolment: 60).

St. Thomas University is an undergraduate, liberal arts institution with a full-time enrolment of 1,600. Its students graduate with Bachelor of Arts, Applied Arts, Education, and Social Work degrees. The faculty members are distinguished teachers, researchers and scholars, and the university holds two Canada Research Chairs.

A PhD, or imminent completion is preferred; a Master's degree or equivalent professional experience is required.
