

Part-Time Positions in Political Science (EXTERNAL)

St. Thomas University invites internal applications for instructors to teach the following course in Fredericton:

Semester 2: (January – April, 2025)

POLS 3973A US Government and Politics, M/W 4:00 PM – 5:20 PM

This course focuses on the governmental structures and political interests that drive the United States. The course will critically examine the problems and possibilities facing the United States as it encounters growing internal fractures, social pressures, and economic divisions.

St. Thomas University is an undergraduate, liberal arts institution with a full-time enrolment of 1,600. Its students graduate with Bachelor of Arts, Applied Arts, Education, and Social Work degrees. The faculty members are distinguished teachers, researchers and scholars, and the university holds two Canada Research Chairs.

A PhD, or imminent completion is preferred; a Master's degree or equivalent professional experience is required. Each applicant is to submit a curriculum vitae, along with pertinent documentation (ex. teaching portfolio etc.) and arrange to have three letters of reference sent directly to Dr. Shaun Narine, Chair, Department of Political Science, St. Thomas University, Fredericton, NB E3B 5G3.
